

2013 East Coast Trip

OVERVIEW

We will be visiting three cities – Philadelphia, New York, and Boston. During the trip, we will be visiting 9 institutions of higher learning between the three cities. These universities are: Villanova University, Swarthmore College, University of Pennsylvania, St. John's University, Columbia University, New York University, Northeastern University, Boston University, and Harvard University. These are among many of the most prestigious universities and colleges in the country.

During our trip, we will visit many famous tourist spots and US historical locations. We will also experience local cuisine and culture - such as cheese steaks and South Street in Philadelphia, Times Square in New York, and Faneuil Hall in Boston.

Twenty students and three chaperones will be on this trip. We will leave early Sunday morning, March 24, 2013 from LAX and arrive in Atlanta to catch a connecting flight to Philadelphia where we will arrive in the evening. Our days will be spent visiting schools and touring the three cities. On our campus tours, students will meet admissions officers, interact with undergraduate students, and learn about life in the colleges and cities.

In the evenings, students and chaperones will be staying in hotels. For meals, we will be eating together in small and large groups. Breakfast will be provided for free at the hotels every morning. Animo Venice will be hosting at least one meal in each city and universities may host lunches as well. This means that students will be responsible for about 6-9 meals or snacks they wish to eat. We will be eating at local affordable and traditional restaurants and delis for students to experience traditional cuisine in the cities we visit. Students should NOT eat at national fast food chain restaurants and must not touch any food and/or drinks in the hotel rooms or they will be responsible to pay for them!!!

We will travel from Philadelphia to New York City, and from New York City to Boston, by bus. We will leave Boston on Saturday, March 30, 2013 for our return. Our returning flight arrives at LAX.

Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

Philadelphia is the largest city in Pennsylvania and the sixth-most-populous city in the United States. Popular nicknames for Philadelphia include "Philly" and "The City of Brotherly Love." Philadelphia contains many national historical sites that relate to the founding of the United States. Center City is the "downtown" and Central Business District of Philadelphia; it is home to most of Philadelphia's tallest buildings, including Philadelphia's City Hall, the tallest masonry building in the world and until the 1987 the tallest in Philadelphia.

Reading Terminal Market is an enclosed farmers' market found at 12th and Arch Streets in downtown Philadelphia. Over 80 merchants offer fresh produce, meats, fish, groceries, flowers, baked goods, crafts, books, clothing, and specialty and ethnic foods. Every space in the market is rented out; three of the vendors are descendants of original market merchants. The market is open every day of the week. http://www.readingterminalmarket.org/

The **Spirits of '76 Ghost Tour** is Philadelphia's scariest haunted tour, visiting more than 20 of Philly's Frights & Sights on a 75-minute ghoulish walking adventure. The Spirits of '76 Ghost Tour features the facts and folklore of haunted Philadelphia. Visit more than 20 scary sites to hear Philadelphia's haunted facts and folklore. Experience Philadelphia's monuments by moonlight. Travel the cobblestone streets of Old City to hear chilling stories about the Spirits of '76, featuring: haunted facts, haunted folklore, and haunted movie sets. South Street is an east-west street in the Center City neighborhood. The stretch of South Street between Front Street and Seventh Street is known for its "bohemian" atmosphere and its wide variety of shops and eateries of many different styles. It is comparable to a large outdoor mall. http://www.southstreet.com/

New York City, New York

The City of New York (most often called New York City) is the most populous city in the United States. It is a leading global city, exerting a powerful influence over worldwide commerce, finance, culture, and entertainment. New York is unique among American cities for its high use of and 24-hour availability of mass transit, and for the overall density and diversity of its population. The city is sometimes referred to as "The City that Never Sleeps," while other

nicknames include Gotham and the Big Apple. Manhattan is a major commercial, financial, and cultural center of both the United States and the world. Most major radio, television, and telecommunications companies in the United States are based here, as well as many news, magazine, book, and other media publishers. It has many famous landmarks, tourist attractions, museums, and universities, and is also home to the headquarters of the United Nations. Manhattan has the largest central business district in the United States. It has been the scene of many important American cultural movements. Manhattan is the borough most closely associated with New York City by non-residents.

The Empire State Building is a 102-story contemporary Art Deco style skyscraper in New York City, declared by the American Society of Civil Engineers to be one of the Seven Wonders of the Modern World. Designed by Shreve, Lamb and Harmon, it was finished in 1931. The tower takes its name from the nickname of New York State. Since the World Trade Center was destroyed on September 11, 2001, it is again the tallest building in New York City. It is currently the second tallest building in the United States after the Sears Tower in Chicago. https://www.esbnyc.com/

Central Park is a large public, urban park in New York City. Most of the areas immediately adjacent to the park are known for impressive buildings and valuable real estate. Central Park has been a National Historic Landmark since 1963. While much of the park looks natural, it is in fact almost entirely landscaped. It contains several natural-looking lakes and ponds, extensive walking tracks, two ice-skating rinks, the Central Park Zoo, the Central Park Conservatory Garden, a wildlife sanctuary, a large area of natural woods, a reservoir with an encircling running track, and the outdoor Delacorte Theater. The park has its own wildlife and also serves as an oasis for migrating birds. The 6 miles of drives within the park are used by joggers, bicyclists and inline skaters,. The real-estate value of Central Park is estimated to be \$528,783,552,000. http://www.centralpark.com/

Matilda the Musical is the winner of a record-breaking seven Olivier Awards including Best Musical. It is more than a show, it's a phenomenon. Times Square is the name given to a principal intersection, at the junction of Broadway and Seventh Avenue, and stretching from West 42nd to West 47th Streets in the New York City borough of Manhattan. Like Red Square in Moscow, Champs-Elysées in Paris, Trafalgar Square in London, or Tiananmen Square in Beijing, it has achieved the status of an iconic world landmark and has become a symbol of New York. Times Square is principally defined by its lighted and animated advertisements. http://timessquare.com/

The **National September 11 Memorial** is a tribute of remembrance and honor to the nearly 3,000 people killed in the terror attacks of September 11, 2001 at the World Trade Center site, near Shanksville, Pa., and at the Pentagon, as well as the six people killed in the World Trade Center bombing in February 1993. The Memorial's twin reflecting pools are each nearly an acre in size and feature the largest manmade waterfalls in the North America. The pools sit within the footprints where the Twin Towers once stood. Architect Michael Arad and landscape architect Peter Walker created the Memorial design selected from a global design competition that included more than 5,200 entries from 63 nations. The names of every person who died in the 2001 and 1993 attacks are inscribed into bronze panels edging the Memorial pools, a powerful reminder of the largest loss of life resulting from a foreign attack on American soil and the greatest single loss of rescue personnel in American history.

Boston, Massachusetts

Boston is the capital and largest city of Massachusetts, and is one of the oldest cities in the United States. Boston is considered the economic and cultural center of the region, and is sometimes regarded as the unofficial "Capital of New England." With many colleges and universities within the city and surrounding area, Boston is a center of higher education and a center for medicine. The city's economy is also based on research, finance, and technology – principally biotechnology. Boston ranks first in the country in jobs per square mile ahead of New York City and Washington DC. Boston is very compact. Downtown Boston's streets are not organized on a grid, but grew in a meandering organic pattern beginning early in the seventeenth century Many consider Boston to have a strong sense of cultural identity, perhaps as a result of its intellectual reputation; much of Boston's culture originates at its universities.

Faneuil Hall, located near the waterfront and today's Government Center, in Boston, Massachusetts, has been a marketplace and a meeting hall since 1742. It was the site of several speeches by Samuel Adams, James Otis, and others encouraging independence from Great Britain, and is now part of Boston National Historical Park and a well-known stop on the Freedom Trail. It is sometimes referred to as "the Cradle of Liberty." http://www.faneuilhallmarketplace.com/

The Freedom Trail is a red (mostly brick) path through downtown Boston, Massachusetts which leads to sixteen significant historic sites. Popular with tourists, it is a 2.5 mile walk from the Boston Common to the Bunker Hill Monument in Charlestown. Part of the Freedom Trail has been included in the longer Boston Harbor Walk. The Freedom Trail is a unit of Boston National Historical Park. http://www.thefreedomtrail.org/

North End is a neighborhood of Boston, Massachusetts. It has the distinction of being the city's oldest residential community, where people have lived continuously since it was settled in the 1630s. Though small (½ mi²), the neighborhood has approximately 100 eating establishments, and a variety of tourist attractions. It is known as the city's Little Italy for its Italian-American population. http://www.northendboston.com

Harvard Square is a large triangular area in the center of Cambridge, Massachusetts, at the intersection of Massachusetts Avenue, Brattle Street, and John F. Kennedy Street. Adjacent to the historic heart of Harvard University, Harvard Yard, the Square (as it is called locally) functions as a commercial center for Harvard students, as well as residents of western Cambridge and the inner western suburbs of Boston. It is also home to Harvard station, a major MBTA Red Line subway bus hub. http://www.harvardsquare.com/

USS Constitution is the oldest commissioned warship afloat in the world. It was first launched in 1797. Constitution is one of six ships ordered for construction by George Washington to protect America's growing maritime interests. The ships greatest glory came during the war of 1812 when she defeated four British frigates which earned her the nickname "Old Ironsides," because cannon balls glanced off her thick hull. The ship was restored in 1927 with contributions from the nation's school children. The Charlestown Navy Yard was built on what was once Mouton's or Morton's Point, the landing place of the British army prior to the Battle of Bunker Hill. It was one of the first shipyards built in the United States. During its 174 year history, hundreds of ships were built, repaired and modernized, including the World War II destroyer USS Cassin Young. Today, thirty acres of the Navy Yard are preserved by the National Park Service as part of Boston National Historical Park. http://www.cityofboston.gov/freedomtrail/ussconstitution.asp
