Undocumented Student - Defined

A student who is not a US citizen or legal permanent resident and who does not currently posses a green card, visa, or other legal documentation is considered an undocumented student.

FERPA

- Undocumented students are protected under the federal law regarding student records.
- The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) requires that educational student records be kept confidential. Information that may be in school records regarding a student's undocumented status must be kept confidential.

Federal DREAM Act

- Development, Relief, and Education for Alien Minors is an American legislative proposal first introduced in the Senate on August 1, 2001.
- It has been re-introduced several times, but not passed.

AB 540

Assembly Bill 540 is a California law that allows undocumented students who meet specified requirements to pay in-state fees (tuition) for California's public colleges and universities.

California Dream Act – AB 130 & 131

- AB 130 allows students that meet the instate tuition requirements to apply for and receive scholarships derived from nonstate funds.
- <u>AB 131</u> allows students that meet the instate tuition requirements to apply and receive financial aid at California public colleges and universities.

Deferred Action

- June 15th Homeland Security announced that effective immediately, certain young people who were brought to the United States as young children, do not present a risk to national security or public safety, and meet several key criteria will be considered for relief from removal from the country or from entering into removal proceedings.

Facts about undocumented students

- 12 million people in the US are undocumented
- Estimated 1.8 million in K-12
- 500,000 Students 9-12
- 65,000 Graduate High School (13% graduate high school)
- 5,000 Pursue Higher Ed (1% pursue higher education)
- 250-500 graduate from college (5%-10% graduate from college)

In California

- California is home to the largest undocumented student population in the US (40%)
- In 2004, 17 California high school Valedictorians were undocumented.

- Often first in family to attend college
- Language barriers
- Historical difficulties in accessing higher education


Unique Challenges

- Fear of deportation
- Not eligible for legal employment
- Not eligible to obtain a driver's license
- Not eligible for Federal Financial Aid



At Animo Venice

- About 30 of Mr. Garcia's students have self-identified as undocumented (current grades 9 and 11)
- Representative of entire student population academically
- Historically have had extremely low four-year college attendance rates
- High occurrence of mental health counseling referrals
- Unknowledgeable / uncomfortable staff
- Limited resources

"I would love to support my students but I feel uncomfortable in relaying the information. I will definitely assist a student if I knew exactly what to do!"


"I am knowledgeable about general laws & policies, but not necessarily specific opportunities available for undocumented students."


1. Do you know what AB 540 means? 2. Have you applied for Deferred Action?



3. Other than your counselor, do any of your teachers know that you are undocumented?





Additional Challenges

- Lack of support to meet the specific needs of undocumented students
 - Difficult to identify
 - Changing policies / Uncertain political climate
 - Student/parent hesitancy to discuss status
 - Educator discomfort / lack of knowledge
 - Limited resources and opportunities
 - Limited opportunities to target these students without victimization

Improvement Plan

- Create club on campus that will provide support and culture of care / safe space.
- Resources and supports to help navigate high school and the road to college and/or employment.
 - Identification
 - Education (of students, parents, and staff)
 - Networking
 - Advocating
